SACRED HEART BUILDS COMMUNITY

In the Sacred Heart of Jesus Parish, parents attend the Catechetical Ministries Program along with their children. Each session begins with joint prayer, then parents meet for adult formation while the children attend Catechism. At the end, everyone comes back together for closing prayers.

The adult formation portion focuses on refreshing what parents learned themselves as children and instructing those who did not have this education. It also helps them engage their children in discussions about faith in the home.

Most sessions are bilingual, taught in English and Spanish, but prayers and songs are in whichever language is spoken during the liturgy the family attends together. As Elsa Michel, Sacred Heart's Director of Catechetical Ministries, explained, "When families can use the language in which they actually pray and celebrate mass to connect with one another, it makes a difference in their spiritual experience."

The catechists of Sacred Heart help parents and children understand that they are on a life-long journey of faith formation. One of their greatest joys—and responsibilities—is modeling a deepening relationship with God. To encourage them in this process, Sacred Heart applied for a grant from the Catholic Foundation for a Basic Catechist Formation and Spiritual Renewal Program.



The eight-week Formation Program will help catechists refresh their basic skills and have an opportunity for mentoring. The Spiritual Renewal Program will include two bilingual retreats to help catechists connect their faith experience and their ministry experience together in a prayerful and spirit-filled way.

The Foundation grant provides money for materials, trained speakers to make presentations in English and Spanish, and retreat facilities. The funds are especially critical because of the recent growth of the program

and for many new volunteers. The program depends on family contributions, but those barely cover basic needs. There is nothing left over for training and spiritual formation of the catechists.

As Elsa explained, "With these new funds, our parish can better serve families by having catechists that are well-prepared to share their faith and who also understand and respect the cultural traditions of our community."

CATHEDRAL MEDICAL CLINIC



The Cathedral Basilica of Saint Joseph is an important symbol of our faith and a gathering place for the Catholic community. But as Monsignor Pat Browne, pastor of the Cathedral, explained, "Our building is far more than an attractive church. It's the center of the largest homeless outreach program in downtown."

A key part of the Cathedral's social justice ministry is a free medical clinic run by Gardner Family Health,

which primarily serves homeless residents of downtown. The central location allows Gardner to reach a population they wouldn't normally be able to serve, and helps keep scores of people out of hospital emergency rooms each year.

Gardner receives a grant from The Health Trust to cover clinic expenses, but parish collections have paid for the salary of a Coordinator to help connect people to services, and for electricity, janitorial, and telephones. Despite the continued generosity of parishioners, the Cathedral needed additional funds to cover these expenses last year. They applied for and received a grant from the Catholic Foundation that closed the gap.

"This clinic is an important way we live out our mission to minister to the poor and homeless," said Monsignor Browne. "The funds from the Foundation are a major help."

PARISHES START YOUNG ADULT MINISTRIES

With funds from the Catholic Foundation, St. Lucy and St. Elizabeth are starting new ministries for young adults that focus on faith formation and fellowship.

At St. Elizabeth's, Tram Nguyen said that young adults now meet monthly to look at life from a theological point of view. "We grew up in the faith of our parents but now that we're in the 'driver's seat,' we're exploring how to use what we learned in church in our adult lives."

"Our monthly meetings allow us to share common experiences and interests as young adults and as people of faith." Tram says they are also planning retreats to explore spiritual topics on an even deeper level.

Brian Brennan reported that St. Lucy hosted its first young adult gathering at a restaurant, featuring a short talk by

Fr. Kevin Joyce followed by discussion and socializing. It was so successful that gatherings are being planned for once a quarter, and smaller faith sharing groups are also being formed.

Both Brian and Tram are enthusiastic about the potential of the young people in their parishes. "As our connections get stronger, young adults will begin to have a bigger impact on our parish and on the Catholic community as a whole," said Brian.

PARISH BUILDING PROJECTS UNDERWAY




CATHOLIC FOUNDATION'S INVESTMENT MIX

INTERVIEW WITH BOARD MEMBER GERRY FERRARI



When Gerry Ferrari was asked to join the Board of the Catholic Foundation, he was glad to lend his support. Gerry is also a long-time member of the Board of Fellows of Santa Clara University and serves on the Board of Martha's Kitchen, where he also regularly helps unload food deliveries and serve meals to those in need.

INTERVIEW WITH FATHER JON PEDIGO



Fr. Jon Pedigo, pastor of St. Julie, spoke with us about the principles of social ministries and social justice in our parishes, and how the Foundation helps to support this work.

"Charity, social justice, and social action are closely related, and they're most effective when they belong to an entire congregation," he said. "For example, we have a food pantry program at St. Julie

and we have an equally strong ministry that addresses why people in our society suffer the indignity of hunger in the first place." At its food pantry, the parish strives to serve the needy cheerfully and with respect, not pity, while also committing itself to ending hunger.

A recent grant from the Foundation allowed St. Julie to install better storage systems at the food pantry to improve the inventory process and deliver the freshest food possible, to enhance the waiting room, and to purchase a special computer program that connects families to a county-wide listing of other important services they need.

"This grant represents strong support from the larger church," said Fr. Jon. He believes that through programs like the food pantry, Catholics in our community are learning that "social action binds those who suffer with those who care for the suffering in a loving relationship that transforms both of them."


